Educator Licensure

Licensure Registration

In order to be valid for employment all educator licenses must be registered in ELIS. The fee is \$10 per year per license. Additional regions may be added at no cost.

When do you register your license?

1. When your license is first issued - your license is not valid until it is registered.
2. When you complete your renewal cycle and enter your professional development. This will occur every 5 years for most licenses. Make sure you are aware of your validity period as it is the license holder's responsibility to maintain their license properly.

If you are a teacher or a substitute teacher in Franklin, Johnson, Massac or Williamson County, please ensure that your license is registered in the Regional Office of Education #21.

Kick-Off Time! Community Prevention Resources Kicks-off 3 Returning Communication Campaigns to Help Prevent Substance Use in Local Communities.

These communication campaigns include two locally-designed campaigns addressing the risks of drinking alcohol underage (Use Your Cube and the Elephant Is In The Room), and one state-designed campaign addressing the risks of vaping (I Don't Vape). The overall intent of these campaigns is to help empower healthy behavior by educating students and parents on the risks of these substances and their effects, using available data and connecting it in ways that are relatable.

Use Your Cube: A Communication Campaign Designed to Help Students Stay Alcohol-Free - Returning to a Middle School Near You!

Use Your Melon, Use Your Head, Use Your Tube... These are just a few of the branding ideas that we are highlighting to kick off the new school year. Use Your Cube has been around to teach middle school students about the risks of underage drinking for a long time. We thought it might be a good time to review the outtakes of the original branding.

This may sound silly, because it is. Tuning in to what might make a student laugh or make them feel seen is how Use Your Cube gets their attention. Students are savvy so it can be a challenge to keep up with them, but it's worth it! We want students to be prepared to counter misinformation and navigate tricky situations.

In the "Illinois Youth Survey: Youth Alcohol Use in Illinois," data shows that underage alcohol use is primarily socially motivated, and that most teens overestimate the number of their classmates who are using alcohol. ¹In the Use Your Cube campaign, accurate social perceptions and social consequences are some of the main factors we focus on. Students need to have real data that they can understand and use.

The Elephant is in the Room: A Communication Campaign Designed to Help Parents Keep Their Kids Alcohol-Free - Kicking off a new school-year near you!

SET YOUR KIDS UP FOR SUCCESS IN AND OUT OF THE CLASSROOM.

Youth alcohol use remains a problem. According to the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism in "Parenting to Prevent Childhood Alcohol Use," the percentage of teenagers who drink alcohol is slowly declining; however, numbers are still high. 25.6% of adolescents report drinking by 8th grade, and about 41.7% report being drunk at least once by 12th grade.¹

So what can we do?

We can work together and help support kids' overall health and wellness by being informed and talking with kids about the risks of underage drinking. The more conversations we have with our youth the better decisions they will make.

I Don't Vape: A Communication Campaign Dedicated to Helping Eldorado High School Students Understand the Risks of the Vaping Epidemic - Is Coming Back for a New School Year!

It's no secret that teen cigarette smoking has been declining significantly for years, but according to "E-Cigarette Use Among Illinois Teens 2018," e-cigarette use is on the rise at rates that surpass past teen cigarette use when teen rates were high. This increase is staggering, and puts teens at risk for addiction and other health consequences. 40% of 10th and 12th grade students surveyed said that there was low or no risk of harming themselves if they use e-cigarettes, which is a clear indication that more education is needed.¹

Eldorado High School and Community Prevention Resources will continue to educate students on the risks and empower their healthy futures!

It's Time to Register for the Illinois Youth Survey!


Please take a moment now to [register your school](#) for the 2022 Illinois Youth Survey (IYS). The IYS has been used since 1993 to survey the health and social indicators of Illinois youth. You can use the individualized reports to assess your school's needs, track progress towards physical, social and mental health goals, and evaluate student support services. You can identify current issues to target, and compare trend data. This is particularly important with all the changes that Covid-19 has brought to our communities.

Register now for the upcoming survey period (January-May 2022) for all 8th, 10th, & 12th grade students at your school. High schools who are interested in surveying other grades are welcome to, but should understand that they will not receive comparative data for 9th & 11th graders.

PRO TIP: January and February usually have the least scheduling conflicts. Accurate data is at the heart of this survey, so it is important to schedule the survey during a time when all or most of the students are available. If a particular group of students are out for a field trip, then the data will not show the full picture of your school and may skew the data significantly.

Teacher Grants & Free Resources for Classroom Enrichment

We all know teachers' budgets can be tight and many educators spend their own money. According to a recent survey conducted by [AdoptAClassroom.org](https://www.adoptaclassroom.org), teachers spent an average of \$750 out of pocket on school supplies during the 2020–21 school year, and 30 percent of teachers spent \$1,000 or more.

To help alleviate some of these budget strains and ensure that you and your students have what you need to make this school year a success, we've compiled a list of organizations that offer teacher grants and free classroom resources.

Classroom Enrichment Grants

[NEA Foundation Student Success Grants](#): Applications due by October 15, 2021 This grant is offered at two levels of funding—either \$2,000 or \$5,000.

[National Council of Teachers of Mathematics](#) (NCTM): Applications due by November 1, 2021, Funding ranges from \$1,500 to \$24,000.

[Walmart Community Grant Program](#): Applications due by December 31, 2021. Walmart awards annual grants ranging from \$250 to \$5,000.

[Toshiba America Foundation Grants for Grades K–5](#): Applications Due: October 1, 2021 Educators with innovative teaching ideas, specifically project-based learning proposals, can be awarded up to \$1,000 through this grant.

[Toshiba America Foundation Grants for Grades 6–12](#): Application due dates vary. Grants are available to help bring their best new teaching ideas to life.
