Educator Licensure

Did you know? License Renewal

If you are up for license renewal this fiscal year FY21, you may renew your Professional Educator License on the Educator Licensure Information System (ELIS) system anytime after April 1, 2021. If you hold a Professional Educator License, it **must** be renewed every five years. All endorsements are renewed with your license. All teachers and school support services personnel must complete 120 hours of professional development to renew, regardless of the number or types of degrees held. Effective July 1, 2021, school districts will be **CENTER of ILLINOIS** required by the Student Online Personal Protection Act (SOPPA) to provide additional guarantees that student data is protected when collected by educational technology companies, and that data is used for beneficial purposes only (105 ILCS 85). 




Illinois Youth Survey




National Take-Back Day

IDEA Announces 2021 Take Back Day Due to the increase of opioid overdose deaths during the pandemic, the Drug Enforcement Administration has scheduled its 20th Take Back Day on **April 24, 2021**. In October 2020, during the last Take Back Day, the DEA collected a record-high amount of expired, unwanted, and unused prescription medications, with the public turning in close to 500 tons of unwanted drugs. Over the 10-year span of Take Back Day, DEA has brought in more than 6,800 tons of prescription drugs. With studies indicating a majority of abused prescription drugs come from family and friends, including from home medicine cabinets, clearing out unused medicine is essential.

The public can drop off potentially dangerous prescription medications at collection sites which will adhere to local COVID-19 guidelines and regulations in order to maintain the safety of all participants and local law enforcement. DEA and its partners will collect tablets, capsules, patches, and other solid forms of prescription drugs. Liquids (including intravenous solutions), syringes and other sharps, and illegal drugs will not be accepted. DEA will continue to accept vaping devices and cartridges at its drop off locations provided lithium batteries are removed. Helping people dispose of potentially harmful prescription drugs is just one way the DEA is working to reduce addiction and stem overdose deaths.




National Library Week (April 4-10, 2021)
